### **REGULAR MEETING OF MAYOR AND COUNCIL July 11, 2018**

**THE CAUCUS MEETING** of the Mayor and Council was called to order by Mayor Larson at 4:30pm at the Borough Hall, on East 7<sup>th</sup> Street. He stated that adequate notice of this meeting has been provided in accordance with the NJ Open Public Meetings Act. Notice of this meeting was posted on the bulletin board in Borough Hall on January 3, 2018 and was published in the Asbury Park Press on January 8, 2018 and in the Beach Haven Times, both newspapers are designated by Mayor and Council to receive such notice.

ROLL CALL: Spark, Wellington, Reynolds, Foley, and Mikuletzky

Also present: Mayor Larson, Terry Brady, Borough Attorney and Brenda Kuhn

**Discussion:** Mayor Larson commenced the meeting with the topic of the proposed habitat restoration project. He said that a meeting was held at Borough Hall earlier in the day with the State and Federal Government representatives about the proposed habitat and the agreement that they wanted the Borough to sign. Due to recent information that was sent to them, they were going on the assumption that the property in question belonged to the Borough. Original they acquired approval from Tidelands and now they couldn't proceed until we signed the agreement. There were a few things that the Borough wanted removed from the agreement and Eric Schrading from the USFW was agreeable to change it. There was discussion about access to the jetty for emergencies, the pond, and would the plovers actually go there to nest. The Mayor said that we would do a resolution to authorize the execution of the agreement and the attorney would review the agreement before it was signed.

Mayor Larson talked about 6<sup>th</sup> Street parking. He said that the Borough should wait on acting on the ordinance until the golf course opened. Councilwoman Reynolds said that the street was narrow and that it was the truck route. The Mayor said maybe we should have no parking on the south side of 6<sup>th</sup>.

Councilman Mikuletzky said that the dredge was taking sand from the south bar and thought that they should take sand from the north bar where it would do some good. Someone said that the sand was going to the Harvey Cedar replenishment.

There was a discussion about meetings that Mayor Larson and Councilwoman Foley attended about wind farms in the ocean and clean energy and the effects on the fishing industry. Councilman Mikuletzky said that the wind mills would never pay for themselves. Councilwoman Foley said that there are wind turbines near Heathrow Airport that are magnetizing all the steel pipes lining the bulkhead at the airport which is affecting the aircraft compasses. She said that anytime electricity goes through a wire there is magnetism associated with it. She said that tests have been done to see if sharks, crabs and other saltwater species would cross the cables. She stated the some species will and some won't.

**Mayor Larson** asked for a motion to close the Caucus. On a motion by Reynolds, seconded by Foley and carried by all the Caucus Meeting was closed.

The Mayor congratulated Mr. Alloway.

The Municipal Attorney, Terry Brady administered the Oath of Office to Samuel P. Alloway.

#### **COMMITTEE REPORTS:**

**FINANCE: Councilman Spark** said that a lot of money was going out this month. He said that more than \$950,000 paid county taxes, \$116,000 went to LBI schools, 55,000 went to Ocean County sewer, nearly \$160,000 paid Regional School tax and \$86,000 went to Tuckerton Lumber. Mayor Larson asked about the tax rate and the Tax Collector said it was held up by the schools.

**DOCKS AND HARBORS: Councilman Wellington** said that \$19,000 had been collected in dock fees to date which is down from this time last year by \$200. He reported that the ramp shack will be completed as soon as the trim work is finished tomorrow. Regarding the pavilion Councilman Wellington said that the band stand was being constructed and the handicap rails came in. He reported that the sprinkler system was installed and the original plan was to lay sod but after getting quotes he could not justify spending the money. He said that a couple of inches of topsoil would be put down and then it would be hydroseeded at a third of the cost of sod.

BEACHES AND PARKS: Councilwoman Reynolds said that DPW was very busy unburying benches on the beach and that the weather and not being able to drive on the beach was slowing the progress. They were also clearing walkways and cutting grass. She said that people were complaining about debris on the beaches and that we don't consider shells and eel grass on the beach as debris. She said that it is natural and it helps to build the beach. She said that there were 3 nests of Piping Plover this year and that it seemed as if 6 chicks survived and 2 have fledged. She said that work had been done at the Bay Beach. She stated that DPW removed sand and replaced it with fresh sand. Councilwoman Reynolds said that the water is tested weekly at the bay beach and one advisory was issued but it was never closed. She said that the Health Department lifted the advisory after retesting the water. Reynolds said that the beach badge revenue was down and that the dog park revenue was \$5300. She reported that the lifeguards were very busy due to the rip currents cause by the hurricane near South Carolina. She said that there were 29 rescues with 50 victims, an exhausted paddle boarder and two people fell on the jetty. She reported that one of the beach badge checkers was hit by a beach patron and the police were called.

**WATER/SEWER: Councilwoman Foley** said that usage was up 62 % above May. She said that the Water Report was posted on the website. She reported that 5 fire hydrants were replaced and we were waiting on parts to fix 2 that were leaking. The councilwoman said that there were 4 more commercial water meters to be installed and that they would be done in the fall.

**PUBLIC SAFETY: Councilman Mikuletzky** said that he wanted to make the monthly court report a part of the minutes. He said that \$1100 was taken in by the court and BL kept almost \$250. Mayor Larson said that it cost about \$12,000 a year to run the court and we may collect seven or eight thousand in fees. He also said that one of the badge checkers was attacked on the beach and there was an arrest. Councilman Spark asked Councilman Mikuletzky to explain the blinking pedestrian red light at the end of Surf City. He said solid red means STOP, yellow is WARNING TO STOP, and flashing is PROCEED WITH CAUTION. He said he saw people running red lights in town and making a left on red.

**PUBLIC WORKS: Mayor Larson** said to make the public work report a part of the minutes. He said that the 22<sup>nd</sup> Street entrance to the beach had to be closed due to the Piping Plovers. He said that we opened up 30<sup>th</sup> Street for access. Councilwoman Reynolds said That PW did a good job opening it because it was still very high.

**OPEN PUBLIC SESSION:** Mayor Larson asked for a motion to open the open public session. There was a motion by Wellington, seconded by Reynolds and carried by all.

Tim Brindley, 1404 Bayview Avenue, talked about the beach replenishment. He said the boat that was pumping outside of our inlet on the south bar was considerably out further than it looks. He said it really won't affect Barnegat Light. There was more discussion about the replenishment, the lumps and how they could affect the waves coming into the beach. Rosa Borenstein, 7 West 6<sup>th</sup> Street, was concerned about the pending ordinance regarding parking on 6<sup>th</sup> Street between Broadway and Bayview. Mayor Larson said that the council was not going to act on the ordinance until they can see what happens after the mini golf opens. She said she counted 22 parking spaces at the pavilion and wanted to know how many the golf course had in their plans. She was told that there were 15 and that the golf course patrons could use the parking at the pavilion too. Mary from Barnegat Light, couldn't understand last name or address, asked if there ever was any talk about have a beach staying open later than 5:00. Councilwoman Reynolds said that we tried that out last year if it was a really nice day and they would stay an extra hour. She said that a couple of guards would ride up and down the beach and keep and eye on the swimmers but with the Piping Plovers nesting on our beaches vehicle use on the beaches are limited. Rosa Borenstein asked about the Ospreys. Councilwoman Reynolds said they seemed to be doing well. She said that once the nest was built, "Mrs. Osprey" had 2 suitors and then 2 chicks. She said that the chicks were apparently ready to fledge. Some said that they thought they observed flying lessons!

**CLOSE PUBLIC SESSION:** Mayor Larson asked for a motion to close the open public session. On a motion by Spark, seconded by Foley and carried by all the meeting was closed to the public.

### ORDINANCE 2018-09

AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF BARNEGAT LIGHT, COUNTY OF OCEAN, STATE OF NEW JERSEY, AMENDING AND SUPPLEMENTING CHAPTER 153 OF THE BOROUGH CODE TO PROVIDE FOR LIABILIY FOR DAMAGING THE BOROUGH SEWER SYSTEM.

**BE IT ORDAINED** by the Mayor and Borough Council of the Borough of Barnegat Light, County of Ocean, State of New Jersey, as follows:

**SECTION 1.** Section 153-14 (entitled "Repairs,") of Article I (entitled "Operation and Supervision of System,") of Chapter 144 (entitled "SEWERS AND WATER,") of the Borough Code of the Borough of Barnegat Light, is hereby amended and supplemented to provide as follows:

#### **CHAPTER 153**

#### **SEWERS AND WATER**

#### Article I

### **Operation and Supervision of System**

§ 153-14. Repairs.

All service pipes connected to the water curb box and sewer system shall at all times be kept in good order and repair by the owner of the property at his own expense, and on failure to do so the water and sewer may be cut off and kept cut off until such pipes shall be put in good order and repair and the expense of cutting off and turning on the same shall be paid by the owner to the Borough. The Borough shall maintain and repair the water and sewer supply to the street as well as the water curb box and the lateral from the main line to the curb.

No person, property owner, contractor or other party shall damage or cause to be damaged the water or sewer supply lines of the Borough from the curb to the water or sewer main in the street.

All other sections of Barnegat Light Borough Code Chapter 153, Article I, shall remain in full force and effect.

**SECTION 2.** Section 153-28 (entitled "Prohibited discharges; preliminary treatment; special agreements,") of Article II (entitled "Sewer Use,") of Chapter 144 (entitled "SEWERS AND WATER,") of the Borough Code of the Borough of Barnegat Light, is hereby amended and supplemented to provide a revised title and new subsections F. & G. to provide as follows:

#### **CHAPTER 153**

### **SEWERS AND WATER**

### Article II

#### Sewer Use

- § 153-28. Prohibited discharges; preliminary treatment; special agreements; damage to Borough's system; notice to Borough.
- F. No person, property owner, contractor or other party shall damage or cause to be damaged the water or sewer supply lines of the Borough from the curb to the water or sewer main in the street.
- G. Prior to the performance of any work or maintenance upon the sewer service to the property from the curb to the building onsite, the property owner, contractor shall notify the Borough Water/Sewer Dept that such work and/or maintenance is about to occur in order that the Borough may monitor the same to assure that no damage to Borough facilities occurs.

All other paragraphs, subsection and sections of Barnegat Light Borough Code Section 153-28 shall remain in full force and effect.

**SECTION 3.** All ordinances of parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

**SECTION 4.** This ordinance shall take effect immediately upon its enactment after second reading and publication as required by law.
